I. Welcome and Introductions

F. Pavon-Lara and A. Klacsmann welcomed participants and facilitated introductions, and then briefly reviewed topics discussed at the previous IY LN.

II. Updates since previous PPLN

Following up on L. Lopez' suggestion that DMH create an IY resource library, A. Klacsmann stated, while a great idea, A. Klacsmann and F. Pavon-Lara had consulted with managers about this idea and it was not feasible at this time. Providers were encouraged to consult with Dr. Olivia Sanchez (who presented at Learning Network) regarding potential opportunities for reimbursement of materials (IY Training DVDs, etc.).

G. Eckart presented "A Closer Look" at data. Prior to presenting data he encouraged participants to take the information presented with "a big grain of salt," because the sample sizes are very small. Presentation topics included: comparing trends for the ECBI Problem Scale and ECBI Intensity Scale, Problem Scale scores tended to decrease more at post treatment than Intensity Scale scores; comparison of trends on ECBI Intensity and Problem Scale scores and YOQ Total score for clients who completed treatment, across three ethnic groups: Latino, White, and African American/Black; across the same three ethnic groups, compared average client age at the start of treatment, average number of sessions, and most common diagnoses; comparison of ECBI Problem Scale and Intensity Scale and YOQ Total Scale score trends across the most common diagnoses; comparison of percent of clients who completed treatment across the most common diagnoses; comparison of percent of clients who completed treatment across the three ethnic groups listed above.

O. Sanchez described how to request reimbursement from DMH for trainings, materials, and outreach. She passed out examples of forms that need to be submitted and went over how to complete them. She also handed out and reviewed a form listing what is reimbursable and what is not.

- V. Preliminary Validity of the Eyberg Child Behavior Inventory with Filipino Immigrant Parents

D. Coffey gave a presentation on a study he co-authored, an assessment of the ECBI-Filipino Translation's validity with Filipino parents who received IY. The study showed that the Filipino translation of the ECBI appears valid and norms were developed for the translation including clinical cutoffs and reliable change. Limits of the study included small sample size, high treatment dropout rate, and limited range of pathology among participants because most clients' ECBI Problem and Intensity scale scores were in the normal range at the start of treatment.

D. Coffey also presented cultural considerations when working with Filipino families including a long history of domination by several colonial powers and how that influences Filipino culture, for example, American influence on education with English being taught to most children in school and Spain's introduction of Catholicism, the religion practiced by the majority of Filipinos.

Following up on L. Lopez' suggestion of creating a network directory at the last IY LN, A Klacsmann suggested sending out a Survey on Survey Monkey to get sense of what participants want the directory to include. L. Lopez shared his vision of the network, that it would allow participants to share resources, referrals, dates when agencies will start their next treatment group, and languages in which groups are being conducted. Participants agreed a survey would be a good starting place and A. Klacsmann volunteered to send the survey out to participants.
